ELECTROS TAKE A TRIP TO TINDO SOLAR

On Thursday May 24, Year 11 Electrotechnology students set off to Tindo Solar. After Mr Haddad's perfect timing of all buses and trains needed to be caught we arrived at 10am.

Adam met us and took us through to the boardroom and explained to us about how the company came to be and what their product was.

Two young employees; Corey and Dylan, then showed the students through the factory floor. They explained the process through which the solar panels are made, including how the cells are attached and then laminated onto a backing. The cells receive sunlight and the silicon oxides in the solar cells react and convert the electrons

that are released into a current. The current then reaches the inverter where it is turned from DC into the more preferable AC.

Students asked a number of questions and will be aided in their studies in both Cross-Disciplinary Studies and Physics as both discuss renewable energies.

The students enjoyed the experience and stated that they learnt a lot from it. Their application and interest was rewarded with a lunch and then back to school from 1pm onwards.

It is the first part of a longer-term program working with the centre. Next year, students hope to improve the outdoor play spaces for the children living at the centre.

Principal's message

St Patrick's Technical College has long been talking about the many job opportunities that are available to young people in Adelaide's great north. So it was wonderful this month to see some of the great things happening around the City of Playford were being shared with the rest of the state.

According to The Advertiser, the north is seeing \$2.4 billion worth of construction and redevelopment. From an \$80 million Drakes distribution centre to the announcement that Brabham Automotive would build its new racetrack-only BT62s in Edinburgh North, the positive conversation around business in the north is great to hear.

Combine the business confidence with the newest push, to the tune of \$187 million from the State and Federal Governments, to ensure young people are being trained for the state's booming Defence industries, it is a great time to be young and starting your career in a trade.

StPatsTech is in a great position to tap into the Defence industries which are being touted as the next big employer in South Australia. Thanks to our P-TECH Australia program, we are already working with the Defence Teaming Centre and Defence contractors PMB Defence, Century Engineering and Saab Australia to help equip our students with the workplace-specific skills and knowledge designed to meet current and future employment demands.

We are excited about the prospect of more apprenticeships and traineeships being available, and we will be working hand-in-glove with industry and our local and state governments to place our students are at the forefront of these opportunities.

Just remember, gaining a trade qualification must be seen as an equivalent option, perhaps even better, to completing a University degree. In fact, statistics show that the median full-time income for a VET graduate is higher than the median graduate salary for a student completing a Bachelor's degree. Also, 82 per cent of graduates who participated in VET as a part of an apprenticeship or traineeship are employed after training, which is higher than for undergraduates.

With only a few weeks left in Term 2, we are again looking at sending our students out on another block of Work Experience. Our six programmed blocks of Work Experience each year are compulsory for all students and are a cornerstone of the College's approach to training and employment.

While completing our programmed Work Experience blocks is compulsory for students to obtain their VET accreditation, students can of course position themselves more favourably for apprenticeships/traineeships by doing extra blocks in the holidays. In order for any Work Experience blocks to count towards VET accreditation, completed paperwork must be submitted to the College prior to commencing any block. Unfortunately, accreditation cannot occur if paperwork is submitted after the block has been completed.

If students know a business they strongly wish to attend, but are knocked back on the first approach, we encourage them to try again. Employers are very busy, so by being persistent the employer will know that you are interested, serious and enthusiastic about their industry and willing to learn.

During Work Experience blocks, all students are checked on by College staff either by site visits or phone calls to the employer/supervisor. If for some reason a student is unable to attend their arranged Work Experience, can we please ask a parent/guardian to contact the College and the employer to outline the reason.

For parents/guardians, it is also a good reminder to speak to your son/daughter about safe behaviours in the work place. If for some reason your child does not feel comfortable or feels unsafe during their Work Experience block, please let the College know immediately and we will take steps to ensure the safety of the student.



Vinnies put out call for help

St Vincent de Paul Society is appealing for more volunteers for its Elizabeth services.

Vinnies has asked for more people to come forward to help with:

- Fred's Van food service on Wednesday nights and Sunday lunches
- Conference work on Monday, Thursday and Saturdays from 11.30am to 2pm

Mario Trinidad told a recent StPatsTech staff meeting that 60 people per week are approaching the charity seeking help. With just six volunteers working three days a week, Mr Trinidad said more help was urgently needed to address the demand.

He said volunteers would be trained and supported.

Mr Trinidad said more support for Elizabeth's Fred's Van service would also mean it could potentially open another night of the week, which was when families most needed meal support.

Of the 1500 homes located in Elizabeth South, 13 per cent had accessed Vinnies for help or support, Mr Trinidad told College staff.

He said Conference work, which involved interviewing people in need to help to assist them access appropriate services, was more challenging work than food van volunteering but vital for people in crisis. Volunteers need to have good listening skills, empathy, be non-judgemental and must have respect for the clients.

AFL debutant Conor Grey dominant around goals.


There were a couple of injuries suffered from StPatsTech but hope recovery will be swift.
